So, make yourself comfortable, pour yourself a cup of tea, put on some music that you like & look through the zine. Try some of the activities, see what you like and see where they take you.



"I can't draw" or "I'm not artistic" so here are some suggestions to get started and throw those thoughts away.





STARTUP DRAWING




MAKE YOUR MARK

Mark making can happen in all sorts of ways.

Rubbings are a really effective way to get great results.

TOP TIPS

- 1 Leaves are great to use/ anything flat with an interesting texture.
- Crayons or a graphite stick used on their side are ideal.
- 3 Always try and do a rubbing on a flat surface.
- Try using lots of colours.





Artists use all sorts of methods to get the desired result. If you're working from another image why not tape it to the window and trace it.

Treat yourself to some different drawing materials. I love: charcoal pencils, graphite sticks, watercolour pencils & a felt tip pen.


WHY NOT TRY

Going for a walk and collecting things to draw

Start by setting a timer and doing really quick drawings

STARTUP

COllage

Have fun choosing bits of old magazines, newspapers, junk mail, old postcards or bits of drawings to make new art works.

Collage is really accessible to everyone. Take your time cutting out images and layering to get the effect you desire.



It can be fun, personal or political.

I like to use a pritt stick to glue. Easy and wrinkle free.










CUt Rip Stick




STARTUP PHOTOGRAPHY

Photography is accessible & fun. Choose your camera:




SINGLE USE CAMERA

Great if you don't have access to a camera. Film can take a while to get printed but great to have prints (you might use them to draw from)



COMPACT DIGITAL CAMERA

Great if you can upload to a computer



POLAROID

Great fun but film is quite expensive



MOBILE PHONE

Great if you are able to use your data/ upload & share

SET YOURSELF A PROJECT. FIND A SUBJECT THAT YOU LOVE.

HERE ARE SOME IDEAS THAT CAN GET YOU STARTED



INSIDE

Start a project with a friend
Send a daily text:
Take a picture of your breakfast/
your favourite shoes in different
places - stay connected and

have some fun with it.

Photograph everything you can find in your home that starts with the first letter of your name. Take time to set this up and follow the compositional tips on the next 2 pages.

Take a photo out of your window every day for a month.



Write a word to describe how you're feeling using objects you find in your home every day for a week. Take a picture every time you set this up.



OUTSIDE

Take photos of changes in your garden looking for shadows, interesting shapes and textures.

Set yourself a daily walk and take 3 photos on your journey. Take time to think & reflect on what you want to capture.



STARTUP PHOTOGRAPHY: FRAMING YOUR SHOT






DIAGONALS

Using diagonals can lead your eye through the image and make it more dynamic.








CLOSE UP

Go close to your subject.
This helps to get rid of all the clutter and gives the viewer a clear focus on your subject.






INTERESTING ANGLES

Try looking up, down & take time to play around with angles.




so that points of interest lie where thirds intersect in your image.






STARTUP

Start a new theme or just enjoy displaying your artwork in your window. It's the easiest gallery to curate and

you'll bring much joy to passers-by. You can add or change whenever you like and it might inspire your neighbours and help you connect.

PERSONAL PROJECT

Whether you love local history, food, clothes, walking or nature start a journal or sketchbook with ideas around your passion.






Whatever direction you decide to go on your creative journey.
